

## Referencing Activity

All references must be in **alphabetical order at the end of a research project**. Every citation must be references. A reference list is very different from a bibliography.

A **bibliography** is a list of resources used

A **reference** list is every researcher cited in the project must be referenced. If the same researcher is cited more than once from different books or journals both these references must be included.

1. Name of the author(s)
2. Year published
3. Title
4. City published
5. Publisher
6. Pages used

You should include the pages if you are referencing from a journal but this may not be necessary if you are referencing a book. You should include the edition if it is not the first edition of the book.

Last name, First Initial. (Year published). *Title*. City: Publisher, Page(s).

### Example

If I am referencing a book I have used:

Money, J. and Ehrhardt, A.A. (1972). *Man and Woman, Boy and Girl*. Baltimore, MD: John Hopkins University Press. P. 124.

## Harvard Reference List Citations for Print Journal Articles

The standard structure of a print journal citation includes the following components:

- Last name, First initial. (Year published). Article title. *Journal*, Volume (Issue), Page(s).

### Example

Loftus, E.F. and Palmer, J.C. (1974) Reconstruction of automobile destruction: An example of the interaction between language and memory. *Journal of Verbal and Learning and Verbal behaviour*, 13, 585-589.
